Parish council

The Parish council has undergone major changes over the past few months. Jason Davies, Jenny Stewart, Brian Harris, and James Spreckley have all resigned from the Parish council. I would like to thank them all for their hard work and input.

During June's Parish council meeting the following were co-opted onto the parish council. Andrew Round, Jamie Dover, Lee Harper-Smith, Ray Rose, Susan Bradley and Terry Smissen. I would like to extend a warm welcome to all the new and returning parish councillors.

This means the parish council currently have 3 vacancies.

Below are the working groups that each member has joined and their duties:

Shops

The maintenance of the area at the front and back of the doctors, chip shop, one stop and Jasmine House restaurant is not the responsibility of the parish council. These two areas are in fact private land belonging to the businesses. The parish council frequently receive complaints especially regarding litter and the potholes in the car park. All complaints will be dealt with by forwarding to those businesses to ask for the problems to be addressed.

Planning

The parish council have received two planning applications:

152086, Cross Cottage, Removal brick panels,

152197, Land at Hill View, Mill lane, Erection of 2 storey dwelling

Football teams.

Donations.

All applications were considered during July and the following groups will receive a donation: Scouts/beavers/cubs £100 each (£300 combined), Village fete £250, Church for digger work £500. The PC set aside an amount of £1,500 for all donations for the forthcoming year. This leaves £450 for the remainder of 2015 this money has been set aside for other causes/projects.

Dear Friends,

September is almost here with its mellow days and the smell of corn harvest in the air. Children are kitted out ready for a new school year and after quiet August the busyness returns. My diary for September is packed already! But I can still find time for parishioners!

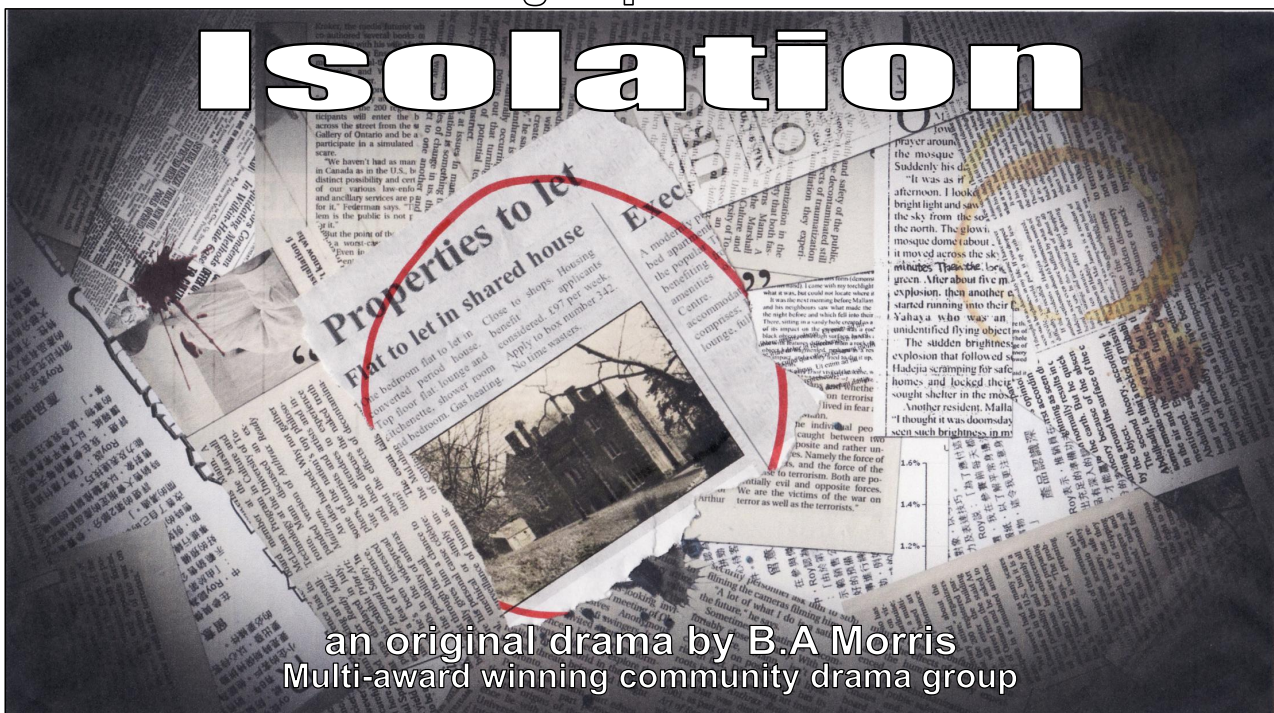
When I was installed as priest in charge of Credenhill nearly four years ago, I was given the bishop's 'cure of souls'. This term 'souls' is used for all the inhabitants of a parish (regardless of whether they attend church or what religion they are, or if they even believe in God) and, as a doctor has the cure of his or her patients physically and mentally in mind, a bishop and priest is concerned with the soul and its well-being and health. All of us are born with a conscience and we are able to know what right and what wrong behaviour is, but we all do things that hurt or offend others, and we all tend to do selfish things without thinking through the consequences that can cause distress and harm to other people. When someone is hurt in this way, God too is hurt; we offend God because he loves all of us and, like a parent, he is saddened when his children hurt each other.

But he has provided a way for us to put things right again: we just need to accept what his Son Jesus has done for us when he was crucified on the cross; he died to take the punishment we deserve for all the bad things we do throughout our lives, and when we believe in that and allow him to be a part of our lives, he restores our relationship with God the Father, and also enables us to live better lives with his guidance. We cannot be perfect in this life, but God will perfect us in the next and ultimately this is the 'cure of souls'. So, you see, I am here for all of you, whether you just want a natter, or to get something off your chest, or just to have someone sit and listen to you, I will make myself available for you. Pear chutney

Ingredients

60ml/2¼fl oz olive oil	400ml/14¼oz cider vinegar
1 tsp fresh rosemary, finely chopped	100g/3½oz crystallised ginger, finely sliced
200g/7¼oz sultanas	800g/1lb 12¼oz pears cored and cut into wedges
100g/3½oz raisins	½ tsp sea salt
100g/3½oz demerara sugar /or coconut sugar	½ tsp nutmeg, freshly grated
	2 tsp ground allspice
	1 good pinch of saffron

Preparation method

Heat a large saucepan with the oil, add the rosemary, sultanas, raisins and sugar and fry them until the fruit begins to caramelise.

Pour in the vinegar and boil on a high heat for three minutes. Then add the rest of the ingredients, bring to the boil, then turn to a simmer and cook until most of the liquid has evaporated.

Because of the fruit, this chutney has a tendency to stick to the bottom of the pan, so stir it well and keep an eye on it. Don't let the pears cook too much; they should keep their shape.

Spoon it into clean hot jars, filling them as full as you can, and seal while hot. Store in the fridge.



Churchwardens' Report.

A very big thank you to those of you who have supported our events this month.

The Village Festival seems a long time ago but as this is the first CCN since then we would like to express our thanks to everyone who supported the event. Special thanks to the Karney family who welcomed us into their home. Just over £2,000 was raised from which a donation was given to Air Ambulance, the Community Hall roof fund and £1,500 to St Mary's Church. The highlights of the day included a dog show and Ledbury Community Brass Band. The setting was perfect and many people sat around listening to the band enjoying refreshments. Children's events were free and many joined in the circus skills workshop, the races or watched the Punch and Judy show. Most of the stallholders wore historical costumes, adding to the atmosphere.

The Pimms, Prosecco and Performance, Summer Soiree was very successful. The compare, Trevor James kept the evening flowing with his funny stories in between the acts which included the Monday Choir, who entertained us with a very wide range of songs; Darren Coates with his magic and illusions; Rev Rana, Megan and Chrissie who led us in a tribute to Abba accompanied by Trevor on the drums and Mike Honeysett and Don Coates who recited monologues and stories. She will move into an Independent Living complex as soon as a unit is available. GARDENING - SEPTEMBER *to do*

The Leominster Hoard.

One day in 2010 my granddaughter Millie and I decided to do some metal detecting on a field near Leominster. My good friend and work colleague Martin agreed to come with us. We had been given permission to search this new field owned by a farmer who knew us well. After a short time Martin got a deep feint signal and decided to dig. As Martin dug deeper and deeper we looked at each other and frowned, when you get a really deep signal like this it usually ends up being a large iron horseshoe, or a piece of a broken plough. However, as it was still a good signal we carried on loosening the soil around the object and I was removing handfuls of soil when we suddenly realised that I had some Roman coins in my hand. We were both stunned by this and carefully lifted some more of the soil out to reveal a mound of flat discs at the base of the hole about 16 inches deep. We instinctively realised that we had found a hoard of Roman coins but how many? Who buried them? Why didn't they come back to dig them back up?

We didn't disturb the find any more and Martin immediately contacted the museum Finds Liaison Officer, Mr Peter Reville, who is based in Ludlow and he said he would be with us shortly. Meanwhile I phoned Ray the landowner who arrived a short time later. Ray had always said that he believed that there had been Roman activity on his land but had no real evidence for this. However, it just goes to show that nobody knows the land better than the people who live and work on it. Peter arrived, recorded the location, took some photos and confirmed that it was a hoard. As it was a Friday he couldn't excavate the find until Monday. There was no other option but to savour the moment for a bit longer, fill in the hole, replace the turf as best we could, and leave it there for the next three days, hoping that nobody would stumble across the disturbed ground and dig it up. On the Monday Peter began the excavation and during the process we took lots of photos. It took about 4 hours to excavate the hoard and secure it safely ready to be sent off to the British Museum for cleaning and recording. The clump of coins was about the size of a bag of sugar.

We have searched that field and the surrounding ones extensively for two years now and we have found nothing else. We believe that the coins were buried in a quiet secluded spot away from prying eyes. As of this moment in time the 518 coins from the late third century have been cleaned and recorded at the British museum and have been declared treasure at Hereford coroner's court. The next step is that the coins will be valued and a decision will be made as to where the coins will be displayed. The amount and type of the coins will probably be of little financial reward but what was really exciting for us was that we had found something that had a lot of archaeological significance. We felt lucky to have found it and privileged to be part of the excavation process. Has this been the apex of our detecting career? Well it has..... so far!

A Watch Scheme can help to promote a caring community that is focussed on trust and respect, in which people feel safe from harm and enjoy a good quality of life. A Watch Scheme **is about** making sure that no one has to feel afraid, vulnerable or isolated in the place where they live or work. It's about people looking out for each other to create real communities that benefit everyone.

The **activities** of Watch Schemes are characterised by their diversity, there is not just one way to do things.

Watch schemes are supported by the Police by way of newsletters, community alert messages, texts, emails, tweets in fact the whole range of social media. There is also a National network with approximately 4million households as members. Being a member of a watch scheme keeps you informed, and in turn helps to build that safe and friendly community. In return, the Police will hope you will use that information and inform them about any suspicious persons, vehicles or activity, because before almost every crime or incident there is usually some suspicious activity. Today, the Police need your help, to help you.

Where a Watch Schemes exists, a place becomes more friendly and cohesive with research showing a significant fall in crime or the opportunities for crime.

The Summer Sun Shines on Pomona Solar Co-operative

Pomona's first 140 kW solar array was commissioned on 23rd June on time and on budget, a feather in the cap of any engineering project. The Pomona board are also delighted to announce that the array is now feeding power to Hereford Casks, a local company making casks for the independent brewing industry. Chris Strange, Owner of Hereford Casks says "The scheme will help our business, because we will be able to buy some of our electricity from the solar cooperative more cheaply than we buy it from the grid".

The Stoke Edith based community energy project is building 250 kW of ground mounted solar PV. The scheme is on target to complete the final 3 sections, which will follow Western Power's upgrade of the main grid transformer. This final phase will result in the supply of solar electricity to two more local businesses.

Generating the equivalent electricity consumption of about 60 homes, the scheme is estimated to displace the equivalent of approximately 100 tonnes of CO2 every year. The panels are being installed and financed through a community co-operative. Members of the public buy shares and become a member of the co-operative.

The Pomona board are dedicated to supporting the local community and will be endowing a community fund using some of the scheme's profit. This will provide approximately £1000 pa to be distributed to local good causes. Some profit will also go to shareholders in the form of interest, projected to average approximately 6% over 20 years, and repayment of share capital.

As a co-operative, the scheme embodies all the international co-operative values of democracy, equality, community engagement, education and open membership. Community based, renewable energy schemes like Pomona Solar are vital to the rural regeneration and the regional growth of Herefordshire.
